Early next month, Berkeley's Human Relations and Welfare Commission will send the City Council a draft ordinance against discrimination on the basis of a person's sexual orientation. The current draft (available from the commission -- which wants written comments by Thursday, June 1-- at 2180 Mil-via St., 644-6645) forbids 'dis-crimination based on sexual or-ientation'' in the following cases: * by employers, unions or agenientation" in the following cases: * by employers, unions or agen-cies in job-related situations; * by landlords or other princi-pal parties in transactions in-volving homes and apartments and by hotels, motels and busi-nesses or by the City of Berke-ley or any educational institu-tion furnishing services and/or facilities. The commission voted to con-fine the law's prohibitions to discrimination on the basis of "an individual's actual or sup-posed choice of sexual partners,"

posed choice of sexual partners," rather than including "physical characteristics, personal man-nerisms, or modes of dress" that indicate that choice. -- David Kolsky



Police said it appeared the of-ficer was searching inside the car after he stopped the motor-ist, and that he accidentally lost his own gun and then found it again. --(ZNS)



Press Grills Chilean Torture Ship Captain

The real power of the press was demonstrated this week when Bay Area reporters forced Chi-lean officials to throw open a carefully screened press con-ference aboard the torture ship Esmeralda and face more than an hour of hostile questions about the country's repressive military regime.

The press conference had ori-ginally been open to only a hand-ful of local television stations and San Francisco's Examiner and Chronicle. The Oakland Tri-bune, all Bay Area radio sta-tions and all alternative news services and papers were origi-nally excluded from the Chilean consul's list of media to be al-lowed aboard the ship. But after a show of solidarity on the pier where the ship was docked (reporters from the Chronicle and Examiner refused The press conference had ori-

to attend if others were exclud-ed), Chilean officials relented and invited all representatives of local media aboard the ship. Primed for a fight after the consul's attempt to exclude them, the reporters presed question

Primed for a fight after the consul's attempt to exclude them, the reporters pressed question after question on the Esmeral-da's use as an internment cen-ter and torture facility for poli-tical prisoners during the 1974 Chilean coup. Captain Victor Larenas, skip-per of the Esmeralda, waffled back and forth before finally denying that the ship had been used to torture dissidents. Larenas dismissed questions about the ship's infamous repu-tation saying, "People who wish to attack the prestige of the Chilean regime do so by attack-ing this ship. . The power of the press has been used to spread these lies about our country."

The "Real Thing" **Refreshes** More

The use of cocaine by young people has jumped sharply in the past year, a new federal survey shows. The government's annual 'Na-tional Survey on Drug Use'' for 1977 reports that nearly one in every five Americans between

18 and 25 has experimented with cocaine. Approximately 11 percent of the high school seniors ques-tioned reported having tried "coke," and three percent de-scribed themselves as users. That same survey found that 66 percent of the high school seniors polled admitted to using marijuana, with one in 11 stat-ing they smoke daily. The three most popular drugs, the government reports, were tobacco, pot, and alcohol, re-spectively. --(ZNS)

The Mexicans say they are confident they can come up with some sort of effective chemical warning before the end of this year.

A Southern California firm calied Southland Helicopters has quietly been training the helicop-ter pilots involved in paraquat spraying programs in Mexico, according to a Los Angeles Times report. The trainees are reportedly ngaged in simulated missions in Southern California on how to spray chemicals such as para-quat and 2,4-D from the air while avoiding gunfire from the ground. American funding and training of the pilots in the U.S. contin-ues while American officials spraying program as "entirely a Mexican governmat effort." Meanwhile some weed grown

Meanwhile some weed grown in Hawaii may be contaminated as well. Sugar cane growers in the Hilo area say they spray paraquat on their fields to get rid of excess leaves. Many Ha-waiian pot growers reportedly raise their crops among the rows of cane to hide them from authorities. authorities.

The American government's National Institute on Drug Abuse is pushing to expand drug-eradi-cation programs similar to pa-raquat spraying into cocaine-producing areas of Bolivia and Peru, New Times magazine re-ports.

A Northern California plant expert reports that paraquat spraying is also wiping out cer-tain species of house plants in Mexico. Dale Williams of the San Fran-cisco Bromeliad Society says that paraquat sprayed in Mexi-co is killing off all kinds of vegetation, not just marijuana plants. He adds that the chemi-cal is reported to have conta-minated water supplies in Oxa-ca, causing residents there to be afraid to drink it. --(ZNS)
